Hybrid Methods for Equilibrium Problems and Fixed Points Problems of a Countable Family of Relatively Nonexpansive Mappings in Banach Spaces

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The purpose of this paper is to introduce hybrid projection algorithms for finding a common element of the set of common fixed points of a countable family of relatively nonexpansive mappings and the set of solutions of an equilibrium problem in the framework of Banach spaces. Moreover, we apply our result to the problem of finding a common element of an equilibrium problem and the problem of finding a zero of a maximal monotone operator. Our result improve and extend the corresponding results announced by Takahashi and Zembayashi (2008 and 2009), and many others.

1. Introduction

Let E be a real Banach space and E^* the dual space of E . Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of E and f a bifunction from $C \times C$ to \mathbb{R} , where \mathbb{R} denotes the set of real numbers. The equilibrium problem is to find $p \in C$ such that

$$f(p, y) \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C. \quad (1.1)$$

The set of solutions of (1.1) is denoted by $EP(f)$. Given a mapping $T : C \rightarrow E^*$, let $f(x, y) = \langle Tx, y - x \rangle$ for all $x, y \in C$. Then, $p \in EP(f)$ if and only if $\langle Tp, y - p \rangle \geq 0$ for all $y \in C$, that is, p is a solution of the variational inequality. Numerous problems in physics, optimization, and economics reduced to find a solution of (1.1). Some methods have been proposed to solve the

equilibrium problem; see, for instance, Blum and Oettli [1], Combettes and Hirstoaga [2], and Moudafi [3].

Recall that a mapping $S : C \rightarrow C$ is said to be nonexpansive if

$$\|Sx - Sy\| \leq \|x - y\|, \quad \forall x, y \in C. \quad (1.2)$$

We denote by $F(S)$ the set of fixed points of S . If a Banach space E is uniformly convex, $C \subset E$ is bounded, closed and convex, and S is a nonexpansive mapping of C into itself, then $F(S)$ is nonempty; see [4] for more details. Recently, many authors studied the problem of finding a common element of the set of fixed points of a nonexpansive mapping and the set of solutions of an equilibrium problem in the framework of Hilbert spaces and Banach spaces, respectively; see, for instance, [5–13] and the references therein.

A popular method is the hybrid projection method developed by Nakajo and Takahashi [14], Kamimura and Takahashi [15], and Martinez-Yanes and Xu [16]; see also [5, 17–20] and references therein. Recently Takahashi et al. [21] introduced an alterative projection method, which is called the shrinking projection method, and they showed several strong convergence theorems for a family of nonexpansive mappings. In 2008, Takahashi and Zembayashi [12] introduced two iterative sequences for finding a common element of the set of fixed points of a relatively nonexpansive mapping and the set of solution of an equilibrium problem in a Banach space. Then they prove strong and weak convergence of the sequences. Very recently, Takahashi and Zembayashi [13] proved a strong convergence theorem for finding a common element of the set of solutions of an equilibrium problem and the set of fixed points of a relatively nonexpansive mapping in a Banach space by using a new hybrid method.

On the other hand, motivated by Nakajo and Takahashi [14], Matsushita and Takahashi [17] reformulated the definition of the notion and obtained weak and strong convergence theorems to approximate a fixed point of a single relatively nonexpansive mapping. Very recently, Aoyama et al. [22] introduce a Halpern type iterative sequence for finding a common fixed point of a countable family of nonexpansive mappings. Let $x_1 = x \in C$ and

$$x_{n+1} = \alpha_n x + (1 - \alpha_n) T_n x_n \quad (1.3)$$

for all $n \in \mathbb{N}$, where C is a nonempty closed convex subset of a Banach space; $\{\alpha_n\}$ is a sequence in $[0, 1]$, and $\{T_n\}$ is a sequence of nonexpansive mappings with some condition. They proved that $\{x_n\}$ defined by (1.3) converges strongly to a common fixed point of $\{T_n\}$.

Motivated and inspired by the research going on in this direction, we prove a strong convergence theorem for finding a common element of the set of solutions of an equilibrium problem and the set of common fixed points of a countable family of relatively nonexpansive mappings in a Banach space by using the shrinking projection method. Further, we apply our result to the problem of finding a common element of an equilibrium problem and the problem of finding a zero of a maximal monotone operator. The result obtained in this paper improves and extends the corresponding result of [13] and many others.

2. Preliminaries

Let E be a real Banach space with norm $\|\cdot\|$ and let E^* be the dual of E . For all $x \in E$ and $x^* \in E^*$, we denote the value of x^* at x by $\langle x, x^* \rangle$. The normalized duality mapping J from E to E^* is defined by

$$Jx = \{x^* \in E^* : \langle x, x^* \rangle = \|x\|^2 = \|x^*\|^2\}, \quad (2.1)$$

for $x \in E$. By Hahn-Banach theorem, $J(x)$ is nonempty; see [4] for more details. We denote the strong convergence and the weak convergence of a sequence $\{x_n\}$ to x in E by $x_n \rightarrow x$ and $x_n \rightharpoonup x$, respectively. We also denote the weak* convergence of a sequence $\{x_n^*\}$ to x^* in E^* by $x_n^* \rightharpoonup^* x^*$. A Banach space E is said to be strictly convex if $\|(x+y)/2\| < 1$ for all $x, y \in E$ with $\|x\| = \|y\| = 1$ and $x \neq y$. It is also said to be uniformly convex if for each $\varepsilon \in (0, 2]$, there exists $\delta > 0$ such that $\|x+y\|/2 \leq 1 - \delta$ for $x, y \in E$ with $\|x\| = \|y\| = 1$ and $\|x-y\| \geq \varepsilon$. A uniformly convex Banach space has the Kadec-Klee property, that is, $x_n \rightharpoonup x$ and $\|x_n\| \rightarrow \|x\|$ imply $x_n \rightarrow x$. Let $S(E) = \{x \in E : \|x\| = 1\}$ be the unit sphere of E . Then the Banach space E is said to be smooth provided that

$$\lim_{t \rightarrow 0} \frac{\|x+ty\| - \|x\|}{t} \quad (2.2)$$

exists for each $x, y \in S(E)$. It is also said to be uniformly smooth if the limit is attained uniformly for $x, y \in S(E)$. It is well known that if E is smooth, strictly convex and reflexive, then the duality mapping J is single valued, one-to-one and onto.

Let E be a smooth, strictly convex and reflexive Banach space, and let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of E . Throughout this paper, we denote by ϕ the function defined by

$$\phi(y, x) = \|y\|^2 - 2\langle y, Jx \rangle + \|x\|^2 \quad \forall x, y \in C. \quad (2.3)$$

It is obvious from the definition of the function ϕ that $(\|x\| - \|y\|)^2 \leq \phi(y, x) \leq (\|y\|^2 + \|x\|^2)$, for all $x, y \in E$. Following Alber [23], the generalized projection Π_C from E onto C is defined by

$$\Pi_C(x) = \arg \min_{y \in C} \phi(y, x), \quad \forall x \in E. \quad (2.4)$$

If E is a Hilbert space, then $\phi(y, x) = \|y-x\|^2$ and Π_C is the metric projection of H onto C . We know the following lemmas for generalized projections.

Lemma 2.1 (Alber [23], Kamimura and Takahashi [15]). *Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a smooth, strictly convex and reflexive Banach space E . Then*

$$\phi(x, \Pi_C y) + \phi(\Pi_C y, y) \leq \phi(x, y), \quad \forall x \in C, y \in E. \quad (2.5)$$

Lemma 2.2 (Alber [23], Kamimura and Takahashi [15]). *Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a smooth, strictly convex and reflexive Banach space E ; let $x \in E$, and let $z \in C$. Then*

$$z = \Pi_C x \iff \langle y - z, Jx - Jz \rangle \leq 0, \quad \forall y \in C. \quad (2.6)$$

Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a smooth, strictly convex and reflexive Banach space E ; let T be a mapping from C into itself. We denote by $F(T)$ the set of fixed point of T . A point $p \in C$ is said to be an asymptotic fixed point of T if there exists $\{x_n\}$ in C which converges weakly to p and $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - Tx_n\| = 0$. The set of asymptotic fixed points of T will be denoted by $\hat{F}(T)$. Following Matsushita and Takahashi [17], a mapping T from C into itself is said to be relatively nonexpansive if $F(T)$ is nonempty, $\phi(u, Tx) \leq \phi(u, x)$, for all $u \in F(T)$, $x \in C$, and $\hat{F}(T) = F(T)$.

The following lemma is according to Matsushita and Takahashi [17].

Lemma 2.3 (Matsushita and Takahashi [17]). *Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a smooth, strictly convex and reflexive Banach space E , and let T be a relatively nonexpansive mapping from C into itself. Then $F(T)$ is closed and convex.*

We also know the following three lemmas.

Lemma 2.4 (Kamimura and Takahashi [15]). *Let E be a uniformly convex and smooth Banach space, and let $\{x_n\}, \{y_n\}$ be sequences in E such that either $\{x_n\}$ or $\{y_n\}$ is bounded. If $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \phi(x_n, y_n) = 0$, then $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - y_n\| = 0$.*

Lemma 2.5 (Xu [24], Zălinescu [25, 26]). *Let E be a uniformly convex Banach space, and let $r > 0$. Then there exists a strictly increasing, continuous, and convex function $g : [0, 2r] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ such that $g(0) = 0$ and*

$$\|tx + (1-t)y\|^2 \leq t\|x\|^2 + (1-t)\|y\|^2 - t(1-t)g(\|x - y\|), \quad (2.7)$$

for all $x, y \in B_r$ and $t \in [0, 1]$, where $B_r = \{z \in E : \|z\| \leq r\}$.

Lemma 2.6 (Kamimura and Takahashi [15]). *Let E be a smooth and uniformly convex Banach space and let $r > 0$. Then there exists a strictly increasing, continuous, and convex function $g : [0, 2r] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ such that $g(0) = 0$ and*

$$g(\|x - y\|) \leq \phi(x, y) \quad (2.8)$$

for all $x, y \in B_r$.

For solving the equilibrium problem, let us assume that a bifunction f satisfies the following conditions:

(A1) $f(x, x) = 0$ for all $x \in C$;

(A2) f is monotone, that is, $f(x, y) + f(y, x) \leq 0$ for all $x, y \in C$;

(A3) for each $x, y, z \in C$,

$$\lim_{t \rightarrow 0^+} f(tz + (1-t)x, y) \leq f(x, y); \quad (2.9)$$

(A4) for each $x \in C$, $y \mapsto f(x, y)$ is convex and lower semicontinuous.

The following result is in Blum and Oettli [1].

Lemma 2.7 (Blum and Oettli [1]). *Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a smooth, strictly convex and reflexive Banach space E , and let f be a bifunction from $C \times C \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ satisfying (A1)–(A4), and let $r > 0$ and $x \in E$. Then, there exists $z \in C$ such that*

$$f(z, y) + \frac{1}{r} \langle y - z, Jz - Jx \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C. \quad (2.10)$$

We also know the following lemmas.

Lemma 2.8 (Takahashi and Zembayashi [12]). *Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a uniformly smooth, strictly convex and reflexive Banach space E , and let f be a bifunction from $C \times C \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ satisfying (A1)–(A4). For $r > 0$ and $x \in E$, define a mapping $T_r : E \rightarrow C$ as follows:*

$$T_r(x) = \left\{ z \in C : f(z, y) + \frac{1}{r} \langle y - z, Jz - Jx \rangle \geq 0, \forall y \in C \right\} \quad (2.11)$$

for all $x \in E$, Then, the following holds:

- (1) T_r is single-valued;
- (2) T_r is a firmly nonexpansive-type mapping, that is, for all $x, y \in E$,

$$\langle T_r x - T_r y, J T_r x - J T_r y \rangle \leq \langle T_r x - T_r y, J x - J y \rangle; \quad (2.12)$$

- (3) $F(T_r) = \widehat{F}(T_r) = \text{EP}(f)$;
- (4) $\text{EP}(f)$ is closed and convex.

Lemma 2.9 (Takahashi and Zembayashi [12]). *Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a smooth, strictly convex and reflexive Banach space E , and let f be a bifunction from $C \times C \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ satisfying (A1)–(A4). Then for $r > 0$, $x \in E$, and $q \in F(T_r)$,*

$$\phi(q, T_r x) + \phi(T_r x, x) \leq \phi(q, x). \quad (2.13)$$

3. Main Results

Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a Banach space E ; let $\{T_n\}$ be a family of mappings of C into itself with $F := \bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} F(T_n) \neq \emptyset$ and $\omega_w(z_n)$ denotes the set of all weak subsequential limits of a bounded sequence $\{z_n\}$ in C . $\{T_n\}$ is said to satisfy the NST*-condition [27] if for every bounded sequence $\{z_n\}$ in C ,

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|z_{n+1} - z_n\| = \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|z_n - T_n z_n\| = 0 \text{ implies } \omega_w(z_n) \subset F. \quad (3.1)$$

In this section, by using the NST*-condition, we prove two strong convergence theorems for finding a common element of the set of solutions of an equilibrium problem and the set of fixed points of a countable family of relatively nonexpansive mappings in a Banach space.

Theorem 3.1. *Let E be a uniformly convex and uniformly smooth Banach space, and let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of E . Let f be a bifunction from $C \times C$ to \mathbb{R} satisfying (A1)–(A4), and let $\{S_n\}$ be a family of relatively nonexpansive mappings from C into itself such that $\Omega := (\bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} F(S_n)) \cap \text{EP}(f) \neq \emptyset$. Let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by $x_0 = x \in C$, $C_0 = C$, and*

$$\begin{aligned} y_n &= J^{-1}(\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JS_n x_n), \\ u_n &\in C \text{ such that } f(u_n, y) + \frac{1}{r_n} \langle y - u_n, Ju_n - Jy_n \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C, \\ C_{n+1} &= \{z \in C_n : \phi(z, u_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n)\}, \\ x_{n+1} &= \Pi_{C_{n+1}} x, \end{aligned} \quad (3.2)$$

for every $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, where J is the duality mapping on E , $\{\alpha_n\} \subset [0, 1]$ satisfies $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n) > 0$ and $\{r_n\} \subset [a, \infty)$ for some $a > 0$. Suppose that $\{S_n\}$ satisfy the NST*-condition. Then $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_{\Omega} x$, where Π_{Ω} is the generalized projection of E onto $\Omega := (\bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} F(S_n)) \cap \text{EP}(f)$.

Proof. Putting $u_n = T_{r_n} y_n$ for all $n \in \mathbb{N}$, we have from Lemma 2.9 that T_{r_n} are relatively nonexpansive.

We first show that C_n is closed and convex. It is obvious that C_n is closed. Since

$$\phi(z, u_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n) \iff \|u_n\|^2 - \|x_n\|^2 - 2\langle z, Ju_n - Jx_n \rangle \geq 0, \quad (3.3)$$

C_n is convex. So, C_n is a closed convex subset of E for all $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$.

Next, we show by induction that $\Omega := (\bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} F(S_n) \cap \text{EP}(f)) \subset C_n$ for all $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$. From $C_0 = C$, we have $\Omega \subset C_0$. Suppose that $\Omega \subset C_k$ for some $k \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$. Let $u \in \Omega \subset C_k$.

Since T_{r_k} and S_k are relatively nonexpansive, it follows that

$$\begin{aligned}
\phi(u, u_k) &= \phi(u, T_{r_k} y_k) \leq \phi(u, y_k) \\
&= \phi\left(u, J^{-1}(\alpha_k Jx_k + (1 - \alpha_k)JS_k x_k)\right) \\
&= \|u\|^2 - 2\langle u, \alpha_k Jx_k + (1 - \alpha_k)JS_k x_k \rangle + \|\alpha_k Jx_k + (1 - \alpha_k)JS_k x_k\|^2 \\
&\leq \|u\|^2 - 2\alpha_k \langle u, Jx_k \rangle - 2(1 - \alpha_k) \langle u, JS_k x_k \rangle + \alpha_k \|x_k\|^2 + (1 - \alpha_k) \|S_k x_k\|^2 \\
&= \alpha_k \phi(u, x_k) + (1 - \alpha_k) \phi(u, S_k x_k) \leq \phi(u, x_k).
\end{aligned} \tag{3.4}$$

Hence $u \in C_{k+1}$. This implies that $\Omega \subset C_n$ for all $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$. So, $\{x_n\}$ is well defined.

Next, we show that $\{x_n\}$ is bounded. From the definition of x_n , we have

$$\phi(x_n, x) = \phi(\Pi_{C_n} x, x) \leq \phi(u, x) - \phi(u, \Pi_{C_n} x) \leq \phi(u, x), \tag{3.5}$$

for all $u \in \Omega \subset C_n$. Thus $\{\phi(x_n, x)\}$ is bounded and therefore $\{x_n\}$ and $\{S_n x_n\}$ are also bounded.

From $x_{n+1} \in C_{n+1} \subset C_n$ and $x_n = \Pi_{C_n} x$, we have

$$\phi(x_n, x) \leq \phi(x_{n+1}, x), \quad \forall n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}. \tag{3.6}$$

This implies that $\{\phi(x_n, x)\}$ is nondecreasing and so $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \phi(x_n, x)$ exists. Since

$$\phi(x_{n+1}, x_n) = \phi(x_{n+1}, \Pi_{C_n} x) \leq \phi(x_{n+1}, x) - \phi(\Pi_{C_n} x, x) \leq \phi(x_{n+1}, x) - \phi(x_n, x), \tag{3.7}$$

for all $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, it follows that $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \phi(x_{n+1}, x_n) = 0$. From $x_{n+1} = \Pi_{C_{n+1}} x \in C_{n+1}$, we have

$$\phi(x_{n+1}, u_n) \leq \phi(x_{n+1}, x_n), \quad \forall n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}. \tag{3.8}$$

Therefore, we also have

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \phi(x_{n+1}, u_n) = 0. \tag{3.9}$$

Since $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \phi(x_{n+1}, x_n) = \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \phi(x_{n+1}, u_n) = 0$ and E is uniformly convex and smooth, it follows from Lemma 2.4 that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_{n+1} - x_n\| = \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_{n+1} - u_n\| = 0. \tag{3.10}$$

Thus, we have

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - u_n\| = 0. \tag{3.11}$$

Since J is uniformly norm-to-norm continuous on bounded sets, it follows by (3.11) that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|Jx_n - Ju_n\| = 0. \quad (3.12)$$

Let $r = \sup_{n \in \mathbb{N}} \{\|x_n\|, \|S_n x_n\|\}$. Since E is a uniformly smooth Banach space, we note that E^* is a uniformly convex Banach space. Therefore, by Lemma 2.5, there exists a continuous, strictly increasing, and convex function g with $g(0) = 0$ such that

$$\|\alpha x^* + (1 - \alpha)y^*\|^2 \leq \alpha \|x^*\|^2 + (1 - \alpha)\|y^*\|^2 - \alpha(1 - \alpha)g(\|x^* - y^*\|) \quad (3.13)$$

for $x^*, y^* \in B_r^* = \{z \in E^* : \|z\| \leq r\}$ and $\alpha \in [0, 1]$. So, we have

$$\begin{aligned} \phi(u, u_n) &= \phi(u, T_{r_n} y_n) \leq \phi(u, y_n) = \phi\left(u, J^{-1}(\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JS_n x_n)\right) \\ &= \|u\|^2 - 2\langle u, \alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JS_n x_n \rangle + \|\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JS_n x_n\|^2 \\ &\leq \|u\|^2 - 2\alpha_n \langle u, Jx_n \rangle - 2(1 - \alpha_n) \langle u, JS_n x_n \rangle + \alpha_n \|x_n\|^2 + (1 - \alpha_n) \|S_n x_n\|^2 \\ &\quad - \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n)g(\|Jx_n - JS_n x_n\|) \\ &= \alpha_n \phi(u, x_n) + (1 - \alpha_n) \phi(u, S_n x_n) - \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n)g(\|Jx_n - JS_n x_n\|) \\ &\leq \phi(u, x_n) - \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n)g(\|Jx_n - JS_n x_n\|) \end{aligned} \quad (3.14)$$

for all $u \in \Omega$. Therefore, we have

$$\alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n)g(\|Jx_n - JS_n x_n\|) \leq \phi(u, x_n) - \phi(u, u_n), \quad \forall n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}. \quad (3.15)$$

Since

$$\begin{aligned} \phi(u, x_n) - \phi(u, u_n) &= \|x_n\|^2 - \|u_n\|^2 - 2\langle u, Jx_n - Ju_n \rangle \\ &\leq \left| \|x_n\|^2 - \|u_n\|^2 \right| + 2|\langle u, Jx_n - Ju_n \rangle| \\ &\leq (|\|x_n\| - \|u_n\||)(\|x_n\| + \|u_n\|) + 2\|u\|\|Jx_n - Ju_n\| \\ &\leq \|x_n - u_n\|(\|x_n\| + \|u_n\|) + 2\|u\|\|Jx_n - Ju_n\|, \end{aligned} \quad (3.16)$$

it follows that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (\phi(u, x_n) - \phi(u, u_n)) = 0. \quad (3.17)$$

From $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n) > 0$, we have

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} g(\|Jx_n - JS_n x_n\|) = 0. \quad (3.18)$$

Therefore, we note from the property of g that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|Jx_n - JS_nx_n\| = 0. \quad (3.19)$$

Since J^{-1} is uniformly norm-to-norm continuous on bounded sets, it follows that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - S_nx_n\| = \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|J^{-1}Jx_n - J^{-1}JS_nx_n\| = 0. \quad (3.20)$$

Since $\{S_n\}$ satisfy the NST*-condition, we have $\omega_w(x_n) \subset F := \bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} F(S_n)$. So, we assume that a subsequence $\{x_{n_k}\}$ of $\{x_n\}$ converges weakly to $\hat{x} \in F$. We shall show that $\hat{x} \in EP(f)$. From $u_n = T_{r_n}y_n$ and Lemma 2.9, we have

$$\begin{aligned} \phi(u_n, y_n) &= \phi(T_{r_n}y_n, y_n) \leq \phi(u, y_n) - \phi(u, T_{r_n}y_n) \\ &\leq \phi(u, x_n) - \phi(u, T_{r_n}y_n) = \phi(u, x_n) - \phi(u, u_n). \end{aligned} \quad (3.21)$$

So, we note from (3.17) that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \phi(u_n, y_n) = 0. \quad (3.22)$$

Since E is uniformly convex and smooth and $\{u_n\}$ is bounded, it follows from Lemma 2.4 that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|u_n - y_n\| = 0. \quad (3.23)$$

From $x_{n_k} \rightharpoonup \hat{x}$, $\|u_n - y_n\| \rightarrow 0$ and $\|x_n - u_n\| \rightarrow 0$, we have $y_{n_k} \rightharpoonup \hat{x}$. Since J is uniformly norm-to-norm continuous on bounded sets and (3.23), it follows that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|Ju_n - Jy_n\| = 0. \quad (3.24)$$

From $r_n \geq a$, we have

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \frac{\|Ju_n - Jy_n\|}{r_n} = 0. \quad (3.25)$$

By the definition of $u_n = T_{r_n}y_n$, we have

$$f(u_n, y) + \frac{1}{r_n} \langle y - u_n, Ju_n - Jy_n \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C. \quad (3.26)$$

Replacing n by n_k , we have from (A2) that

$$\frac{1}{r_{n_k}} \langle y - u_{n_k}, Ju_{n_k} - Jy_{n_k} \rangle \geq f(y, u_{n_k}), \quad \forall y \in C. \quad (3.27)$$

Since $f(x, \cdot)$ is convex and lower semicontinuous, it is also weakly lower semicontinuous. Letting $k \rightarrow \infty$, we note from (3.25) and (A4) that

$$f(y, \hat{x}) \leq \liminf_{k \rightarrow \infty} f(y, u_{n_k}) \leq \liminf_{k \rightarrow \infty} \left\langle y - u_{n_k}, \frac{Ju_{n_k} - Jy_{n_k}}{r_{n_k}} \right\rangle = 0, \quad \forall y \in C. \quad (3.28)$$

For t with $0 < t \leq 1$ and $y \in C$, let $y_t = ty + (1-t)\hat{x}$. Since $y \in C$ and $\hat{x} \in C$, we have $y_t \in C$ and hence $f(y_t, \hat{x}) \leq 0$. So, from (A1), we have

$$0 = f(y_t, y_t) \leq tf(y_t, y) + (1-t)f(y_t, \hat{x}) \leq tf(y_t, y). \quad (3.29)$$

This implies that

$$f(y_t, y) \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C. \quad (3.30)$$

Letting $t \rightarrow 0^+$ from (A3), we have

$$f(\hat{x}, y) \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C. \quad (3.31)$$

Therefore, we obtain $\hat{x} \in \text{EP}(f)$. Finally, we will show that $x_n \rightarrow \Pi_{\Omega}x$. Let $w = \Pi_{\Omega}x$. From $x_n = \Pi_{C_n}x$ and $w \in \Omega \subset C_n$, we note that

$$\phi(x_n, x) \leq \phi(w, x). \quad (3.32)$$

Since the norm is weakly lower semicontinuous, it follows that

$$\begin{aligned} \phi(\hat{x}, x) &= \|\hat{x}\|^2 - 2\langle \hat{x}, Jx \rangle + \|x\|^2 \\ &\leq \liminf_{k \rightarrow \infty} \left(\|x_{n_k}\|^2 - 2\langle x_{n_k}, Jx \rangle + \|x\|^2 \right) \\ &= \liminf_{k \rightarrow \infty} \phi(x_{n_k}, x) \\ &\leq \limsup_{k \rightarrow \infty} \phi(x_{n_k}, x) \leq \phi(w, x). \end{aligned} \quad (3.33)$$

From the definition of Π_{Ω} , we have $\hat{x} = w$. Hence $\lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \phi(x_{n_k}, x) = \phi(w, x)$. Therefore, we obtain

$$\begin{aligned} 0 &= \lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} (\phi(x_{n_k}, x) - \phi(w, x)) \\ &= \lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \left(\|x_{n_k}\|^2 - \|w\|^2 - 2\langle x_{n_k} - w, Jx \rangle \right) \\ &= \lim_{k \rightarrow \infty} \left(\|x_{n_k}\|^2 - \|w\|^2 \right). \end{aligned} \quad (3.34)$$

Since E has the Kadec-Klee property, it follows that $x_{n_k} \rightarrow w = \Pi_{\Omega}$. Therefore, $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_{\Omega}x$. \square

As direct consequences of Theorem 3.1, we can obtain the following corollaries.

Corollary 3.2 (Takahashi and Zembayashi [13]). *Let E be a uniformly convex and uniformly smooth Banach space, and let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of E . Let f be a bifunction from $C \times C$ to \mathbb{R} satisfying (A1)–(A4), and let S be a relatively nonexpansive mapping from C into itself such that $\Omega := F(S) \cap \text{EP}(f) \neq \emptyset$. Let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by $x_0 = x \in C$, $C_0 = C$, and*

$$\begin{aligned} y_n &= J^{-1}(\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JSx_n), \\ u_n &\in C \text{ such that } f(u_n, y) + \frac{1}{r_n} \langle y - u_n, Ju_n - Jy_n \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C, \end{aligned} \quad (3.35)$$

$$C_{n+1} = \{z \in C_n : \phi(z, u_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n)\},$$

$$x_{n+1} = \Pi_{C_{n+1}}x,$$

for every $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, where J is the duality mapping on E , $\{\alpha_n\} \subset [0, 1]$ satisfies $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n) > 0$, and $\{r_n\} \subset [a, \infty)$ for some $a > 0$. Then $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to Π_{Ω} , where Π_{Ω} is the generalized projection of E onto $\Omega := F(S) \cap \text{EP}(f)$.

Proof. Put $S_n \equiv S$. Let $\{z_n\}$ be a bounded sequence in C with $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|z_{n+1} - z_n\| = \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|z_n - Sz_n\| = 0$, and let $z \in \omega_w(z_n)$. Then there exists subsequence $\{z_{n_k}\}$ of $\{z_n\}$ such that $z_{n_k} \rightarrow z$. It follows directly from the definition of S that $z \in \widehat{F}(S) = F(S)$. Hence S satisfies NST*-condition, by Theorem 3.1; $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to Π_{Ω} . \square

Corollary 3.3 (Takahashi and Zembayashi [12]). *Let E be a uniformly convex and uniformly smooth Banach space; let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of E . Let f be a bifunction from $C \times C$ to \mathbb{R} satisfying (A1)–(A4). Let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by $x_0 = x \in C$, $C_0 = C$, and*

$$\begin{aligned} u_n &\in C \text{ such that } f(u_n, y) + \frac{1}{r_n} \langle y - u_n, Ju_n - Jx_n \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C, \\ C_{n+1} &= \{z \in C_n : \phi(z, u_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n)\}, \end{aligned} \quad (3.36)$$

$$x_{n+1} = \Pi_{C_{n+1}}x,$$

for every $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, where J is the duality mapping on E and $\{r_n\} \subset [a, \infty)$ for some $a > 0$. Then, $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_{\text{EP}(f)}x$.

Proof. Putting $S_n \equiv I$ in Theorem 3.1, we obtain Corollary 3.3. \square

Corollary 3.4. *Let E be a uniformly convex and uniformly smooth Banach space, and let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of E . Let $\{S_n\}$ be a family of relatively nonexpansive mappings from*

C into itself such that $F := \bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} F(S_n) \neq \emptyset$. Let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by $x_0 = x \in C$, $C_0 = C$, and

$$\begin{aligned} y_n &= \Pi_C J^{-1}(\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JS_n x_n), \\ C_{n+1} &= \{z \in C_n : \phi(z, y_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n)\}, \\ x_{n+1} &= \Pi_{C_{n+1}} x, \end{aligned} \quad (3.37)$$

for every $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, where J is the duality mapping on E , $\{\alpha_n\} \subset [0, 1]$ satisfies $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n) > 0$. Suppose that $\{S_n\}$ satisfy the NST*-condition. Then $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to Π_F , where Π_F is the generalized projection of E onto $F := \bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} F(S_n)$.

Proof. Putting $f(x, y) = 0$ for all $x, y \in C$ and $r_n = 1$ in Theorem 3.1, we obtain Corollary 3.4. \square

Similarly as in the proof of Theorem 3.1, we can prove the following theorem.

Theorem 3.5. *Let E be a uniformly convex and uniformly smooth Banach space, and let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of E . Let f be a bifunction from $C \times C$ to \mathbb{R} satisfying (A1)–(A4) and let $\{S_n\}$ be a family of relatively nonexpansive mappings from C into itself such that $\Omega := (\bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} F(S_n)) \cap \text{EP}(f) \neq \emptyset$. Let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by $x_0 = x \in C$ and*

$$\begin{aligned} y_n &= J^{-1}(\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JS_n x_n), \\ u_n &\in C \text{ such that } f(u_n, y) + \frac{1}{r_n} \langle y - u_n, Ju_n - Jy_n \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C, \\ H_n &= \{z \in C : \phi(z, u_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n)\}, \\ W_n &= \{z \in C : \langle x_n - z, Jx - Jx_n \rangle \geq 0\}, \\ x_{n+1} &= \Pi_{H_n \cap W_n} x, \end{aligned} \quad (3.38)$$

for every $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, where J is the duality mapping on E , $\{\alpha_n\} \subset [0, 1]$ satisfies $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n) > 0$ and $\{r_n\} \subset [a, \infty)$ for some $a > 0$. Suppose that $\{S_n\}$ satisfy the NST*-condition. Then $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_{\Omega} x$, where Π_{Ω} is the generalized projection of E onto $\Omega := (\bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} F(S_n)) \cap \text{EP}(f)$.

Proof. We first show that $H_n \cap W_n$ is closed and convex. It is obvious that H_n is closed and W_n is closed and convex. Since $\phi(z, u_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n) \Leftrightarrow \|u_n\|^2 - \|x_n\|^2 - 2\langle z, Ju_n - Jx_n \rangle \geq 0$, it follows that H_n is convex. Hence $H_n \cap W_n$ is a closed and convex subset of E for all $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$. Similarly as in proof of Theorem 3.1, we note that $\Omega \subset H_n$ for all $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$. Next, we show by induction that $\Omega \subset H_n \cap W_n$ for all $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$. From $W_0 = C$, we note that $\Omega \subset H_0 \cap W_0$. Suppose that $\Omega \subset H_k \cap W_k$ for some $k \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$. Then there exists $x_{k+1} \in H_k \cap W_k$ such that $x_{k+1} = \Pi_{H_k \cap W_k} x$. From the definition of x_{k+1} , we have

$$\langle x_{k+1} - z, Jx - Jx_{k+1} \rangle \geq 0 \quad (3.39)$$

for all $z \in H_k \cap W_k$. Since $\Omega \subset H_k \cap W_k$, we have

$$\langle x_{k+1} - z, Jx - Jx_{k+1} \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall z \in \Omega \quad (3.40)$$

and hence $z \in W_{k+1}$. So, we have $\Omega \subset W_{k+1}$ and therefore, $\Omega \subset H_{k+1} \cap W_{k+1}$. Hence $\Omega \subset H_n \cap W_n$ for all $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$. This implies that $\{x_n\}$ is well defined. By the same argument as in proof of Theorem 3.1, we can prove that the sequence $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_{\Omega}x$. \square

Setting $S_n \equiv S$ in Theorem 3.5, we have the following result.

Corollary 3.6 (Takahashi and Zembayashi [12, Theorem 3.1]). *Let E be a uniformly convex and uniformly smooth Banach space; let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of E . Let f be a bifunction from $C \times C$ to \mathbb{R} satisfying (A1)–(A4), and let S be a relatively nonexpansive mapping from C into itself such that $F(S) \cap \text{EP}(f) \neq \emptyset$. Let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by*

$$\begin{aligned} x_0 &= x \in C, \\ y_n &= J^{-1}(\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JSx_n), \\ u_n &\in C \text{ such that } f(u_n, y) + \frac{1}{r_n} \langle y - u_n, Ju_n - Jy_n \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C, \\ H_n &= \{z \in C : \phi(z, u_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n)\}, \\ W_n &= \{z \in C : \langle x_n - z, Jx - Jx_n \rangle \geq 0\}, \\ x_{n+1} &= \Pi_{H_n \cap W_n} x, \end{aligned} \quad (3.41)$$

for every $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, where J is the duality mapping on E , $\{\alpha_n\} \in [0, 1]$ satisfies $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n) > 0$ and $\{r_n\} \subset [a, \infty)$ for some $a > 0$. Then, $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_{F(S) \cap \text{EP}(f)}x$, where $\Pi_{F(S) \cap \text{EP}(f)}$ is the generalized projection of E onto $F(S) \cap \text{EP}(f)$.

4. Applications

In this section, we apply our result to the problem of finding a common element of an equilibrium problem and the problem of finding a zero of a maximal monotone operator in a Banach space by using the shrinking projection method.

Let E be a real Banach space. An operator $T \subset E \times E^*$ is said to be *monotone* if $\langle x - y, x^* - y^* \rangle \geq 0$ whenever $(x, x^*), (y, y^*) \in T$. We denote the set $\{x \in E : 0 \in Tx\}$ by $T^{-1}0$. A monotone T is said to be *maximal* if its graph $G(T) = \{(x, y) : y \in Tx\}$ is not properly contained in the graph of any other monotone operator. If T is maximal monotone, then the solution set $T^{-1}0$ is closed and convex.

Let E be a smooth, strictly convex and reflexive Banach space, and let $T \subset E \times E^*$ be a maximal monotone operator. Then for each $\lambda > 0$ and $x \in E$, there corresponds a unique element $x_\lambda \in D(T)$ satisfying

$$J(x) \in J(x_\lambda) + \lambda T(x_\lambda); \quad (4.1)$$

see Barbu [28] or Takahashi [4]. We define the *resolvent* of T by $J_\lambda x = x_\lambda$. In other words, $J_\lambda = (J + \lambda T)^{-1}J$ for all $\lambda > 0$. We know that J_λ is relatively nonexpansive and $T^{-1}0 = F(J_\lambda)$ for all $\lambda > 0$ (see [4, 17]), where $F(J_\lambda)$ denotes the set of all fixed points of J_λ . We can also define, for each $\lambda > 0$, the *Yosida approximation* of T by $A_\lambda = \lambda^{-1}(J - JJ_\lambda)$. We know that $(J_\lambda x, A_\lambda x) \in T$ for all $\lambda > 0$.

We now consider the strong convergence theorem for finding a common element of the solution set of an equilibrium problem and the problem of finding a zero of a maximal monotone operator.

Theorem 4.1. *Let E be a uniformly convex and uniformly smooth Banach space. Let $T \subset E \times E^*$ be a maximal monotone operator, and let $J_\lambda = (J + \lambda T)^{-1}J$ for all $\lambda > 0$. Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of E such that $D(T) \subset C \subset J^{-1}(\bigcap_{\lambda>0} R(J + \lambda T))$. Let f be a bifunction from $C \times C$ to \mathbb{R} satisfying (A1)–(A4) with $\Omega := \text{EP}(f) \cap T^{-1}0 \neq \emptyset$. Let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by $x_0 = x \in C$, $C_0 = C$, and*

$$\begin{aligned} y_n &= J^{-1}(\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JJ_{\lambda_n}x_n), \\ u_n \in C \text{ such that } f(u_n, y) + \frac{1}{r_n}\langle y - u_n, Ju_n - Jy_n \rangle &\geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C, \\ C_{n+1} &= \{z \in C_n : \phi(z, u_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n)\}, \\ x_{n+1} &= \Pi_{C_{n+1}}x, \end{aligned} \tag{4.2}$$

for every $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, where J is the duality mapping on E , $\{\alpha_n\} \subset [0, 1]$, $\{\lambda_n\} \in (0, \infty)$ satisfy $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n) > 0$, $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \lambda_n > 0$, and $\{r_n\} \subset [a, \infty)$ for some $a > 0$. Then $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_\Omega x$, where Π_Ω is the generalized projection of E onto $\Omega := \text{EP}(f) \cap T^{-1}0$.

Proof. Let $\{z_n\}$ be a bounded sequence in C such that $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|z_{n+1} - z_n\| = \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|z_n - J_{\lambda_n}z_n\| = 0$, and let $z \in \omega_w(z_n)$. Then, there exists a subsequence $\{z_{n_k}\}$ of $\{z_n\}$ such that $z_{n_k} \rightharpoonup z$. By the uniform smoothness of E , we have

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|Jz_n - JJ_{\lambda_n}z_n\| = 0. \tag{4.3}$$

Since $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \lambda_n > 0$, we have

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|A_{\lambda_n}z_n\| = \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \frac{1}{\lambda_n} \|Jz_n - JJ_{\lambda_n}z_n\| = 0. \tag{4.4}$$

Let $(u, u^*) \in T$. Then it holds from the monotonicity of T that

$$\langle u - J_{\lambda_{n_k}}z_{n_k}, u^* - A_{\lambda_{n_k}}z_{n_k} \rangle \geq 0, \tag{4.5}$$

for all $k \in \mathbb{N}$. Letting $k \rightarrow \infty$, we get $\langle u - z, u^* \rangle \geq 0$. Then, the maximality of T implies $z \in T^{-1}0 := \bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty} F(J_{\lambda_n})$. Hence by Theorem 3.1, $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_\Omega x$. \square

In case $C = E$. Putting $f(x, y) = 0$ for all $x, y \in E$ and $r_n = 1$ in Theorem 4.1, we obtain the following corollary.

Corollary 4.2. *Let E be a uniformly convex and uniformly smooth Banach space. Let $T \subset E \times E^*$ be a maximal monotone operator, and let $J_\lambda = (J + \lambda T)^{-1}J$ for all $\lambda > 0$, with $T^{-1}0 \neq \emptyset$. Let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by $x_0 = x \in E$, $C_0 = E$, and*

$$\begin{aligned} y_n &= J^{-1}(\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JJ_{\lambda_n}x_n), \\ C_{n+1} &= \{z \in C_n : \phi(z, y_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n)\}, \\ x_{n+1} &= \Pi_{C_{n+1}}x, \end{aligned} \quad (4.6)$$

for every $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, where J is the duality mapping on E , $\{\alpha_n\} \subset [0, 1]$, $\{\lambda_n\} \in (0, \infty)$ satisfy $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n) > 0$, $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \lambda_n > 0$. Then $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_\Omega x$, where Π_Ω is the generalized projection of E onto $\Omega := T^{-1}0$.

Similarly as in the proof of Theorem 4.1, we can prove the following theorem.

Theorem 4.3. *Let E be a uniformly convex and uniformly smooth Banach space. Let $T \subset E \times E^*$ be a maximal monotone operator and let $J_\lambda = (J + \lambda T)^{-1}J$ for all $\lambda > 0$. Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of E such that $D(T) \subset C \subset J^{-1}(\bigcap_{\lambda > 0} R(J + \lambda T))$. Let f be a bifunction from $C \times C$ to \mathbb{R} satisfying (A1)–(A4) with $\Omega := \text{EP}(f) \cap T^{-1}0 \neq \emptyset$. Let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by $x_0 = x \in C$ and*

$$\begin{aligned} y_n &= J^{-1}(\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JJ_{\lambda_n}x_n), \\ u_n &\in C \text{ such that } f(u_n, y) + \frac{1}{r_n} \langle y - u_n, Ju_n - Jy_n \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C, \\ H_n &= \{z \in C : \phi(z, u_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n)\}, \\ W_n &= \{z \in C : \langle x_n - z, Jx - Jx_n \rangle \geq 0\}, \\ x_{n+1} &= \Pi_{H_n \cap W_n}x, \end{aligned} \quad (4.7)$$

for every $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, where J is the duality mapping on E , $\{\alpha_n\} \subset [0, 1]$, $\{\lambda_n\} \in (0, \infty)$ satisfy $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n) > 0$, $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \lambda_n > 0$, and $\{r_n\} \subset [a, \infty)$ for some $a > 0$. Then $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_\Omega x$, where Π_Ω is the generalized projection of E onto $\Omega := \text{EP}(f) \cap T^{-1}0$.

Corollary 4.4. *Let E be a uniformly convex and uniformly smooth Banach space. Let $T \subset E \times E^*$ be a maximal monotone operator and let $J_\lambda = (J + \lambda T)^{-1}J$ for all $\lambda > 0$, with $T^{-1}0 \neq \emptyset$. Let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by $x_0 = x \in E$ and*

$$\begin{aligned} y_n &= J^{-1}(\alpha_n Jx_n + (1 - \alpha_n)JJ_{\lambda_n}x_n), \\ H_n &= \{z \in C : \phi(z, y_n) \leq \phi(z, x_n)\}, \\ W_n &= \{z \in C : \langle x_n - z, Jx - Jx_n \rangle \geq 0\}, \\ x_{n+1} &= \Pi_{H_n \cap W_n}x, \end{aligned} \quad (4.8)$$

for every $n \in \mathbb{N} \cup \{0\}$, where J is the duality mapping on E , $\{\alpha_n\} \subset [0, 1]$, $\{\lambda_n\} \in (0, \infty)$ satisfy $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n(1 - \alpha_n) > 0$, $\liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \lambda_n > 0$. Then $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to $\Pi_{\Omega}x$, where Π_{Ω} is the generalized projection of E onto $\Omega := T^{-1}0$.
