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Tripled coincidence point theorems for a φ -contractive mapping in a complete metric space without the mixed g-monotone property

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Abstract

In this paper, we show the existence of a tripled coincidence point theorem and a tripled common fixed point theorem for a φ -contractive mapping in a complete metric space without the mixed g-monotone property, using the concept of (F,g)-invariant set. Further, we apply our results to the existence of a tripled coincidence point of the given mapping in a partially ordered metric space.

Keywords: tripled fixed point; tripled coincidence point; invariant set; mixed *q*-monotone; partially ordered set

1 Introduction

The existence of a fixed point for contraction type mappings in partially ordered metric spaces was first considered recently by Ran and Reurings [1] where they established some new results for contractions in partially ordered metric spaces and presented applications to matrix equations. Later, Nieto and Lopez [2, 3] and Agarwal *et al.* [4] presented some new results for contractions in partially ordered metric spaces.

The concept of coupled fixed point was introduced by Guo and Lakshmikantham [5]. In 2006, Bhaskar and Lakshmikantham [6] introduced the concept of mixed monotone property for contractive operators of the form $F: X \times X \to X$, where X is a partially ordered metric space. They also established coupled fixed point theorems for mappings which satisfy the mixed monotone property. After the publication of this work, many authors conducted research on the coupled fixed point theory in partially ordered metric spaces and different spaces. For example, see [7–19].

Later, Sintunavarat *et al.* [15, 16] proved the existence and uniqueness of coupled fixed point theorems for nonlinear contractions without the mixed monotone property and extended some coupled fixed point theorems of Bhaskar and Lakshmikantham [6] by using the concept of F-invariant set due to Samet and Vetro [10]. Recently, in 2013, Batra and Vashistha [17] introduced the concept of (F,g)-invariant set which is a generalization of an F-invariant set introduced by Samet and Vetro [10] and proved the existence coupled fixed point theorems for nonlinear contractions under c-distance in cone metric spaces having an (F,g)-invariant subset.



Tripled fixed point theorems for nonlinear mappings can be viewed as a generalization of coupled fixed point theorems and those can be applied to ODE problems. In 2011, Berinde and Borcut [20] introduced the concept of tripled fixed point for nonlinear mappings in partially ordered complete metric spaces and obtained existence and uniqueness theorems for contractive type mappings. Later, in 2012, Berinde and Borcut [21] introduced the concept of tripled coincidence point for a pair of nonlinear contractive mappings $F: X^3 \to X$ and $g: X \to X$ and obtained tripled coincidence point theorems which generalized the results of [20]. After the publication of this work, the tripled fixed point and tripled coincidence point theory has been generalized in different directions in several spaces with applications by many mathematicians over the year (see [11, 12, 22–34]).

Since 2011, some authors have studied triple fixed point and tripled coincidence point theory. This theory has received much attention in different spaces. Aydi et~al.~ [30] established some tripled coincidence point results for a mixed g-monotone mapping $F: X^3 \to X$ satisfying (ψ, ϕ) -contractions in ordered generalized metric spaces. Aydi et~al.~ [27] introduced the concept of W-compatible mappings for mappings $F: X^3 \to X$ and $g: X \to X$, where (X, d) is an abstract metric space, and established some tripled coincidence and common tripled fixed point theorems in such spaces. Based on the notion of W-compatible, Aydi and Abbas [28] obtained tripled coincidence and common tripled fixed point results in the partial metric spaces which generalized and extended several well-known comparable results in the existing literature. Afterward, Abbas et~al.~ [23] proved the existence of tripled fixed point and tripled coincidence point theorems in intuitionistic fuzzy normed spaces. The results generalized and extended recent coupled fixed point theorems in intuitionistic fuzzy normed spaces.

On the other hand, a wide discussion on a tripled fixed point and a tripled coincidence point in partially ordered metric spaces has been dedicated to improvement and generalization. In 2011, Abbas *et al.* [22] obtained the existence of a tripled fixed point of multivalued nonlinear contraction mappings in partially ordered metric spaces. Amini-Harandi [11] introduced a new simple and unified approach to coupled and tripled fixed point theory and presented a new tripled fixed point result in partially ordered metric spaces. Later, Hussain *et al.* [12] introduced a new and simple approach to coupled and tripled coincidence point theory. They established coupled coincidence and tripled coincidence point results without any type of commutativity condition on F and g.

One of the simplest ways to develop tripled fixed point and tripled coincidence point theory in partially ordered metric spaces is to consider contraction mappings. Using the concept of mixed monotone, Aydi $et\ al.$ [25] discussed existence and uniqueness of some tripled fixed points for mappings having the mixed monotone property in partially ordered metric spaces by using Meir-Keeler type contractions. Furthermore, Aydi and Karapinar [26] proved some new Meir-Keeler type tripled fixed point theorems on partially ordered complete partial metric spaces. Aydi and Karapinar [29] established some triple fixed point theorems for mappings having the mixed monotone property in partially ordered metric spaces dependent on another contractive condition which is a generalization of the main results of Berinde and Borcut [20]. Charoensawan [33] proved the existence and uniqueness of a tripled fixed point involving a (φ,ψ) -contractive condition for mappings having the mixed monotone property in partially ordered metric spaces.

In the case of tripled coincidence point theory, using the mixed g-monotone property, Borcut [31] established tripled coincidence point theorems for a pair of mappings $F: X^3 \to X$ and $g: X \to X$ satisfying a nonlinear contractive condition and having the mixed g-monotone property in partially ordered metric spaces. The presented theorems extended existing results in the literature. Recently, Choudhury $et\ al.$ [32] established some tripled coincidence point results in partially ordered metric spaces dependent on other contractions. Very recently, Aydi $et\ al.$ [24] established tripled coincidence point theorems for a pair of mappings $F: X^3 \to X$ and $g: X \to X$ satisfying weak ϕ -contractions in partially ordered metric spaces. The results unified, generalized and complemented various known comparable results from Berinde and Borcut [21].

The purpose of this paper is to establish some tripled coincidence point theorems without the mixed g-monotone property by using the concept of (F,g)-invariant set in a complete metric space which are generalizations of the results of Aydi $et\ al.\ [24]$.

2 Preliminaries

Let (X, \leq) be a partially ordered set, and suppose that there is a metric d on X such that (X, d) is a complete metric space. Consider on the product space $X \times X \times X$ the following partial order: for (x, y, z), $(u, v, w) \in X \times X \times X$,

$$(u, v, w) \le (x, y, z) \iff x \ge u, \qquad y \le v, \qquad z \ge w.$$
 (1)

Berinde and Borcut [21] introduced the concept of tripled coincidence point and studied existence and uniqueness theorems in partially ordered complete metric spaces.

Definition 2.1 ([21]) Let(X, \leq) be a partially ordered set and two mappings $F: X \times X \times X \to X$, $g: X \to X$. We say that F has the mixed g-monotone property if for any x, y, $z \in X$,

$$x_1, x_2 \in X, \quad g(x_1) \le g(x_2) \quad \text{implies} \quad F(x_1, y, z) \le F(x_2, y, z),$$
 (2)

$$y_1, y_2 \in X$$
, $g(y_1) \le g(y_2)$ implies $F(x, y_1, z) \ge F(x, y_2, z)$ (3)

and

$$z_1, z_2 \in X$$
, $g(z_1) \le g(z_2)$ implies $F(x, y, z_1) \le F(x, y, z_2)$. (4)

Definition 2.2 ([21]) An element $(x, y, z) \in X \times X \times X$ is called a *tripled coincidence point* of mappings F and g if F(x, y, z) = g(x), F(y, x, y) = g(y) and F(z, y, x) = g(z).

Definition 2.3 ([21]) Let X be a nonempty set and $F: X \times X \times X \to X$, $g: X \to X$ be two mappings. We say F and g are commutative if g(F(x,y,z)) = F(g(x),g(y),g(z)) for all $x,y,z \in X$.

Later, Aydi *et al.* [24] extended the tripled coincidence point theorems for a mixed *g*-monotone operator obtained by Berinde and Borcut [21]. For the sake of completeness, we recollect the main results of Aydi *et al.* [24] here.

Let the set of functions $\Phi = \{ \varphi : [0, +\infty) \to [0, +\infty) : \varphi(t) < t \text{ and } \lim_{r \to t^+} \varphi(r) < t, t > 0 \}.$

Theorem 2.4 ([24]) Let (X, \leq) be a partially ordered set, and suppose that there is a metric d on X such that (X, d) is a complete metric space. Let $F: X \times X \times X \to X$ and $g: X \to X$ be such that F has the mixed g-monotone property and $F(X^3) \subseteq g(X)$. Assume that there is a function $\varphi \in \Phi$ such that

$$d(F(x,y,z),F(u,v,w)) + d(F(y,x,y),F(v,u,v)) + d(F(z,y,x),F(w,v,u))$$

$$\leq 3\varphi\left(\frac{d(g(x),g(u)) + d(g(y),g(v)) + d(g(z),g(w))}{3}\right)$$
(5)

for all $x,y,z,u,v,w \in X$ with $g(x) \ge g(u)$, $g(y) \le g(v)$ and $g(z) \ge g(w)$. Assume that F is continuous, g is continuous and commutes with F.

If there exist $x_0, y_0, z_0 \in X$ *such that*

$$g(x_0) \le F(x_0, y_0, z_0),$$
 $g(y_0) \ge F(y_0, x_0, y_0)$ and $g(z_0) \le F(z_0, y_0, x_0),$

then there exist $x, y, z \in X$ such that

$$g(x) = F(x, y, z),$$
 $g(y) = F(y, x, y)$ and $g(z) = F(z, y, x).$

Definition 2.5 ([24]) Let (X, \leq) be a partially ordered set and d be a metric on X. We say that (X, d, \leq) is regular if the following conditions hold:

- (i) if a non-decreasing sequence $\{x_n\} \to x$ in X, then $x_n \le x$ for all n,
- (ii) if a non-increasing sequence $\{y_n\} \to y$ in X, then $y \le y_n$ for all n.

Theorem 2.6 ([24]) Let (X, \leq) be a partially ordered set, and suppose that there is a metric d on X such that (X, d, \leq) is regular. Suppose that there exist $\varphi \in \Phi$ and mapping $F: X \times X \times X \to X$ and $g: X \to X$ are such that (5) hold for any $x, y, z, u, v, w \in X$ with $g(x) \geq g(u)$, $g(y) \leq g(v)$ and $g(z) \geq g(w)$. Suppose also that (g(X), d) is complete, F has the mixed g-monotone property and $F(X^3) \subseteq g(X)$.

If there exist $x_0, y_0, z_0 \in X$ such that

$$g(x_0) \le F(x_0, y_0, z_0),$$
 $g(y_0) \ge F(y_0, x_0, y_0)$ and $g(z_0) \le F(z_0, y_0, x_0),$

then there exist $x, y, z \in X$ such that

$$g(x) = F(x, y, z),$$
 $g(y) = F(y, x, y)$ and $g(z) = F(z, y, x).$

Batra and Vashistha [17] introduced an (F,g)-invariant set which is a generalization of an F-invariant set introduced by Samet and Vetro [10].

Definition 2.7 ([13]) Let (X, \leq) be a metric space and $F: X \times X \to X$, $g: X \to X$ be given mappings. Let M be a nonempty subset of X^4 . We say that M is an (F,g)-invariant subset of X^4 if and only if, for all $x, y, z, w \in X$,

- (i) $(x, y, z, w) \in M \Leftrightarrow (w, z, y, x) \in M$,
- (ii) $(g(x),g(y),g(z),g(w)) \in M \Rightarrow (F(x,y),F(y,x),F(z,w),F(w,z)) \in M$.

In this article, we establish tripled coincidence point theorems for $F: X \times X \times X \to X$ and $g: X \to X$ satisfying nonlinear contractive conditions without the mixed g-monotone property by using the concept of (F,g)-invariant set in complete metric spaces.

3 Main results

We give the notions of F-invariant set and (F,g)-invariant set which are useful for main results.

Definition 3.1 Let (X, \leq) be a metric space and $F: X \times X \times X \to X$ be a given mapping. Let M be a nonempty subset of X^6 . We say that M is an F-invariant subset of X^6 if and only if, for all $x, y, z, u, v, w \in X$,

$$(x, y, z, u, v, w) \in M$$

$$\Rightarrow (F(x, y, z), F(y, x, y), F(z, y, x), F(u, v, w), F(v, u, v), F(w, u, v)) \in M.$$

Definition 3.2 Let (X, \leq) be a metric space and M be a subset of X^6 . We say that M satisfies *the transitive property* if and only if, for all $x, y, z, u, v, w, a, b, c \in X$,

$$(x, y, z, u, v, w) \in M$$
 and $(u, v, w, a, b, c) \in M \Rightarrow (x, y, z, a, b, c) \in M$.

Definition 3.3 Let (X, \leq) be a metric space and $F: X \times X \times X \to X$, $g: X \to X$ be given mappings. Let M be a nonempty subset of X^6 . We say that M is an (F,g)-invariant subset of X^6 if and only if, for all $x, y, z, u, v, w \in X$,

$$(g(x), g(y), g(z), g(u), g(v), g(w)) \in M$$

$$\Rightarrow (F(x, y, z), F(y, x, y), F(z, y, x), F(u, v, w), F(v, u, v), F(w, u, v)) \in M.$$

Remark 3.4

- 1. The set $M = X^6$ is trivially (F,g)-invariant, which satisfies the transitive property.
- 2. Every F-invariant set is (F, I_X) -invariant, when I_X denotes an identity map on X.

Example 3.5 Let (X, \leq) be a partially ordered set, and suppose that there is a metric d on X such that (X, d) is a complete metric space. Let $F: X \times X \times X \to X$ and $g: X \to X$ be two mappings such that F satisfies mixed g-monotone property. Define a subset $M \subseteq X^6$ by $M = \{(a, b, c, d, e, f) \in X^6 : a \geq d, b \leq e, c \geq f\}$. Then M is an F-invariant and (F, g)-invariant subset of X^6 , which satisfies the transitive property.

The following example shows that we may have an (F,g)-invariant set which is not F-invariant set.

Example 3.6 Let $X = \mathbb{R}$ and $F : X \times X \times X \to X$ be defined by $F(x, y, z) = 1 - x^2$. Let $g : X \to X$ be given by g(x) = x - 1. Then it is easy to show that $M = \{(x, 0, z, u, 0, w) \in X^6 : x = z, u = w\}$ is an (F, g)-invariant subset of X^6 but not an F-invariant subset of X^6 as $(1, 0, 1, 1, 0, 1) \in M$, but $(F(1, 0, 1), F(0, 1, 0), F(1, 0, 1), F(1, 0, 1), F(0, 0, 0), F(1, 0, 1)) = (0, 1, 0, 0, 1, 0) \notin M$.

Our first main result is the following.

Theorem 3.7 Let (X, \leq) be a complete metric space and M be a nonempty subset of X^6 . Assume that there is a function $\varphi: [0, +\infty) \to [0, +\infty)$ with $0 = \varphi(0) < \varphi(t) < t$ and $\lim_{r \to t^+} \varphi(r) < t$ for each t > 0, and also suppose that $F: X \times X \times X \to X$ and $g: X \to X$ are two continuous functions such that

$$d(F(x,y,z),F(u,v,w)) + d(F(y,x,y),F(v,u,v)) + d(F(z,y,x),F(w,v,u))$$

$$\leq 3\varphi\left(\frac{d(g(x),g(u)) + d(g(y),g(v)) + d(g(z),g(w))}{3}\right)$$
(6)

for all $x, y, z, u, v, w \in X$ with $(g(x), g(y), g(z), g(u), g(v), g(w)) \in M$ or $(g(u), g(v), g(w), g(x), g(y), g(z)) \in M$. Suppose that $F(X \times X \times X) \subseteq g(X)$, $g(x) \in M$. Suppose that $g(x) \in G(X)$ commutes with $g(x) \in G(X)$.

If there exists $(x_0, y_0, z_0) \in X \times X \times X$ such that

$$(F(x_0, y_0, z_0), F(y_0, x_0, y_0), F(z_0, y_0, x_0), g(x_0), g(y_0), g(z_0)) \in M$$

and M is an (F,g)-invariant set which satisfies the transitive property, then there exist $x, y, z \in X$ such that

$$g(x) = F(x, y, z),$$
 $g(y) = F(y, x, y)$ and $g(z) = F(z, y, x).$

Proof Let (x_0, y_0, z_0) ∈ $X \times X \times X$ satisfy $(F(x_0, y_0, z_0), F(y_0, x_0, y_0), F(z_0, y_0, x_0), g(x_0), g(y_0), g(z_0))$ ∈ M. Since $F(X \times X \times X) \subseteq g(X)$, we can choose $x_1, y_1, z_1 \in X$ such that $g(x_1) = F(x_0, y_0, z_0), g(y_1) = F(y_0, x_0, y_0)$ and $g(z_1) = F(z_0, y_0, x_0)$. Again from $F(X \times X \times X) \subseteq g(X)$ we can choose $x_2, y_2, z_2 \in X$ such that $g(x_2) = F(x_1, y_1, z_1), g(y_2) = F(y_1, x_1, y_1)$ and $g(z_2) = F(z_1, y_1, z_1)$.

Continuing this process, we can construct sequences $\{g(x_n)\}$, $\{g(y_n)\}$ and $\{g(z_n)\}$ in X such that

$$g(x_n) = F(x_{n-1}, y_{n-1}, z_{n-1}), g(y_n) = F(y_{n-1}, x_{n-1}, y_{n-1})$$

and $g(z_n) = F(z_{n-1}, y_{n-1}, x_{n-1})$ for all $n \ge 1$. (7)

If there exists $k \in N$ such that $g(x_k) = g(x_{k-1})$, $g(y_k) = g(y_{k-1})$ and $g(z_k) = g(z_{k-1})$, then $g(x_k) = g(x_{k-1}) = F(x_{k-1}, y_{k-1}, z_{k-1})$, $g(y_k) = g(y_{k-1}) = F(y_{k-1}, x_{k-1}, y_{k-1})$ and $g(z_k) = g(z_{k-1}) = F(z_{k-1}, y_{k-1}, x_{k-1})$. Thus, $(x_{k-1}, y_{k-1}, z_{k-1})$ is a tripled coincidence point of F. This finishes the proof.

Therefore, we may assume that $g(x_k) \neq g(x_{k-1})$ or $g(y_k) \neq g(y_{k-1})$, or $g(z_k) \neq g(z_{k-1})$ for all $n \geq 1$. Since $(F(x_0, y_0, z_0), F(y_0, x_0, y_0), F(z_0, y_0, x_0), g(x_0), g(y_0), g(z_0)) = (g(x_1), g(y_1), g(z_1), g(x_0), g(y_0), g(z_0)) \in M$ and M is an (F, g)-invariant set, we have $(F(x_1, y_1, z_1), F(y_1, x_1, y_1), F(z_1, y_1, x_1), F(x_0, y_0, z_0), F(y_0, x_0, y_0), F(z_0, y_0, x_0)) = (g(x_2), g(y_2), g(z_2), g(x_1), g(y_1), g(z_1)) \in M$. By repeating this argument, we get $(F(x_{n-1}, y_{n-1}, z_{n-1}), F(y_{n-1}, x_{n-1}, y_{n-1}), F(z_{n-1}, y_{n-1}, x_{n-1}), F(x_n, y_n, z_n), F(y_n, x_n, y_n), F(z_n, y_n, x_n)) = (g(x_n), g(y_n), g(z_n), g(x_{n-1}), g(y_{n-1}), g(z_{n-1})) \in M$ for all $n \geq 1$.

Consider now the sequence of nonnegative real numbers $\{\delta_n\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$ given by

$$\delta_{n-1} = d(g(x_n), g(x_{n-1})) + d(g(y_n), g(y_{n-1})) + d(g(z_n), g(z_{n-1})), \quad n \ge 1.$$
(8)

Since $(g(x_n), g(y_n), g(z_n), g(x_{n-1}), g(y_{n-1}), g(z_{n-1})) \in M$, we have

$$d(F(x_n, y_n, z_n), F(x_{n-1}, y_{n-1}, z_{n-1})) + d(F(y_n, x_n, y_n), F(y_{n-1}, x_{n-1}, y_{n-1}))$$

$$+ d(F(z_n, y_n, x_n), F(z_{n-1}, y_{n-1}, x_{n-1}))$$

$$= d(g(x_{n+1}), g(x_n)) + d(g(y_{n+1}), g(y_n)) + d(g(z_{n+1}), g(z_n))$$

$$= \delta_n.$$

The right-hand side of (6) will be equal to

$$3\varphi\left(\frac{d(g(x_n),g(x_{n-1})) + d(g(y_n),g(y_{n-1})) + d(g(z_n),g(z_{n-1}))}{3}\right) = 3\varphi\left(\frac{\delta_{n-1}}{3}\right). \tag{9}$$

Therefore, the sequence $\{\delta_n\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$ satisfies

$$\delta_n \le 3\varphi\left(\frac{\delta_{n-1}}{3}\right) < \delta_{n-1} \quad \text{for all } n \ge 1.$$
 (10)

From (10) it follows that the sequence $\{\delta_n\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$ is decreasing. Therefore, there exists some $\delta \geq 0$ such that

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} \delta_n = \lim_{n \to \infty} \left[d\left(g(x_{n+1}), g(x_n)\right) + d\left(g(y_{n+1}), g(y_n)\right) + d\left(g(z_{n+1}), g(z_n)\right) \right]$$

$$= \delta. \tag{11}$$

We shall prove that $\delta = 0$. Assume, to the contrary, that $\delta > 0$. Then, by letting $n \to \infty$ in (10), from $0 = \varphi(0) < \varphi(t) < t$ and $\lim_{r \to t^+} \varphi(r) < t$, for each t > 0, we have

$$\delta = \lim_{n \to \infty} \delta_n \le 3 \lim_{n \to \infty} \varphi\left(\frac{\delta_{n-1}}{3}\right) = 3 \lim_{\delta_{n-1} \to \delta^+} \varphi\left(\frac{\delta_{n-1}}{3}\right) < 3\frac{\delta}{3} = \delta, \tag{12}$$

a contradiction. Thus δ = 0 and hence

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} \delta_n = \lim_{n \to \infty} \left[d(g(x_{n+1}), g(x_n)) + d(g(y_{n+1}), g(y_n)) + d(g(z_{n+1}), g(z_n)) \right] = 0.$$
 (13)

We now prove that $\{g(x_n)\}$, $\{g(y_n)\}$ and $\{g(z_n)\}$ are Cauchy sequences in (X,d). Suppose, to the contrary, that at least one of $\{g(x_n)\}$, $\{g(y_n)\}$ or $\{g(z_n)\}$ is not a Cauchy sequence. Then there exists $\varepsilon > 0$ for which we can find subsequences $\{g(x_{m(k)})\}$ and $\{g(x_{n(k)})\}$ of $\{g(x_n)\}$, $\{g(y_{m(k)})\}$ and $\{g(y_{n(k)})\}$ of $\{g(y_n)\}$ and $\{g(y_{n(k)})\}$ and $\{g(y_n)\}$ and $\{g(y_n)\}$

$$d(g(x_{n(k)}), g(x_{m(k)})) + d(g(y_{n(k)}), g(y_{m(k)})) + d(g(z_{n(k)}), g(z_{m(k)})) \ge \varepsilon, \quad k \in \mathbb{N}.$$
 (14)

Further, corresponding to m(k), we can choose n(k) in such a way that it is the smallest integer with $n(k) > m(k) \ge K$ and satisfies (14). Then

$$d(g(x_{n(k)-1}), g(x_{m(k)})) + d(g(y_{n(k)-1}), g(y_{m(k)})) + d(g(z_{n(k)-1}), g(z_{m(k)})) < \varepsilon.$$
(15)

Using (14) and (15) and the triangle inequality, we have

$$\varepsilon \leq r_{k} := d\left(g(x_{n(k)}), g(x_{m(k)}) + d\left(g(y_{n(k)}), g(y_{m(k)})\right) + d\left(g(z_{n(k)}), g(z_{m(k)})\right) \\
\leq d\left(g(x_{n(k)}), g(x_{n(k)-1})\right) + d\left(g(x_{n(k)-1}), g(x_{m(k)})\right) \\
+ d\left(g(y_{n(k)}), g(y_{n(k)-1})\right) + d\left(g(y_{n(k)-1}), g(y_{m(k)})\right) \\
+ d\left(g(z_{n(k)}), g(z_{n(k)-1})\right) + d\left(g(z_{n(k)-1}), g(z_{m(k)})\right) \\
\leq d\left(g(x_{n(k)}), g(x_{n(k)-1})\right) + d\left(g(y_{n(k)}), g(y_{n(k)-1})\right) + d\left(g(z_{n(k)}), g(z_{n(k)-1})\right) \\
+ \varepsilon. \tag{16}$$

Letting $k \to \infty$ in the above inequality and using (13), we get

$$\varepsilon \leq \lim_{k \to \infty} r_k$$

$$\leq \lim_{k \to \infty} \left[d\left(g(x_{n(k)}), g(x_{n(k)-1})\right) + d\left(g(y_{n(k)}), g(y_{n(k)-1})\right) + d\left(g(z_{n(k)}), g(z_{n(k)-1})\right) + \varepsilon \right] = \varepsilon,$$

that is,

$$\lim_{k \to \infty} r_k = \lim_{k \to \infty} \left[d\left(g(x_{n(k)}), g(x_{m(k)})\right) + d\left(g(y_{n(k)}), g(y_{m(k)})\right) + d\left(g(z_{n(k)}), g(z_{m(k)})\right) \right]$$

$$= \varepsilon. \tag{17}$$

Since n(k) > m(k) and M satisfies the transitive property, we get

$$(g(x_{n(k)}), g(y_{n(k)}), g(z_{n(k)}), g(x_{m(k)}), g(y_{m(k)}), g(z_{m(k)})) \in M.$$

Hence we can use (6) to obtain

$$d(g(x_{n(k)+1}), g(x_{m(k)+1})) + d(g(y_{n(k)+1}), g(y_{m(k)+1})) + d(g(z_{n(k)+1}), g(z_{m(k)+1}))$$

$$= d(F(x_{n(k)}, y_{n(k)}, z_{n(k)}), F(x_{m(k)}, y_{m(k)}, z_{m(k)}))$$

$$+ d(F(y_{n(k)}, x_{n(k)}, y_{n(k)}), F(y_{m(k)}, x_{m(k)}, y_{m(k)}))$$

$$+ d(F(z_{n(k)}, y_{n(k)}, x_{n(k)}), F(z_{m(k)}, y_{m(k)}, x_{m(k)}))$$

$$\leq 3\varphi\left(\frac{d(g(x_{n(k)}), g(x_{m(k)})) + d(g(y_{n(k)}), g(y_{m(k)})) + d(g(z_{n(k)}), g(z_{m(k)}))}{3}\right)$$

$$= 3\varphi\left(\frac{r_k}{3}\right). \tag{18}$$

By (18), we have

$$r_{k+1} \le 3\varphi\left(\frac{r_k}{3}\right). \tag{19}$$

Letting $k \to \infty$ in (19) and using (13) and (17) and $\lim_{r \to t^+} \varphi(r) < t$ for each t > 0, we have

$$\varepsilon = \lim_{k \to \infty} r_k \le 3 \lim_{k \to \infty} \varphi\left(\frac{r_k}{3}\right) = 3 \lim_{r_k \to \varepsilon^+} \varphi\left(\frac{r_k}{3}\right) < 2\frac{\varepsilon}{3} = \varepsilon,$$

which is a contradiction. This shows that $\{g(x_n)\}$, $\{g(y_n)\}$ and $\{g(z_n)\}$ are Cauchy sequences. Since X is a complete metric space, there exist $x, y, z \in X$ such that

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} g(x_n) = x, \qquad \lim_{n \to \infty} g(y_n) = y \quad \text{and} \quad \lim_{n \to \infty} g(z_n) = z. \tag{20}$$

From (20) and continuity of g,

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} g(g(x_n)) = g(x), \qquad \lim_{n \to \infty} g(g(y_n)) = g(y) \quad \text{and} \quad \lim_{n \to \infty} g(g(z_n)) = g(z). \tag{21}$$

From (7) and commutativity of F and g,

$$g(g(x_{n+1})) = g(F(x_n, y_n, z_n)) = F(g(x_n), g(y_n), g(z_n)),$$
(22)

$$g(g(y_{n+1})) = g(F(y_n, x_n, y_n)) = F(g(y_n), g(x_n), g(y_n)),$$
 (23)

$$g(g(z_{n+1})) = g(F(z_n, y_n, x_n)) = F(g(z_n), g(y_n), g(x_n)).$$
(24)

We now show that g(x) = F(x, y, z), g(y) = F(y, x, y) and g(z) = F(z, y, x). Taking the limit as $n \to \infty$ in (22), (23) and (24), by (20), (21), continuity of F and commutativity of F and g, we get

$$g(x) = g\left(\lim_{n \to \infty} g(x_{n+1})\right) = \lim_{n \to \infty} g\left(g(x_{n+1})\right) = \lim_{n \to \infty} g\left(F(x_n, y_n, z_n)\right)$$

$$= \lim_{n \to \infty} F\left(g(x_n), g(y_n), g(z_n)\right) = F\left(\lim_{n \to \infty} g(x_n), \lim_{n \to \infty} g(y_n), \lim_{n \to \infty} g(z_n)\right)$$

$$= F(x, y, z),$$

$$g(y) = g\left(\lim_{n \to \infty} g(y_{n+1})\right) = \lim_{n \to \infty} g\left(g(y_{n+1})\right) = \lim_{n \to \infty} g\left(F(y_n, x_n, y_n)\right)$$

$$= \lim_{n \to \infty} F\left(g(y_n), g(x_n), g(y_n)\right) = F\left(\lim_{n \to \infty} g(y_n), \lim_{n \to \infty} g(x_n), \lim_{n \to \infty} g(y_n)\right)$$

$$= F(y, x, y)$$

and

$$g(z) = g\left(\lim_{n \to \infty} g(z_{n+1})\right) = \lim_{n \to \infty} g\left(g(z_{n+1})\right) = \lim_{n \to \infty} g\left(F(z_n, y_n, x_n)\right)$$
$$= \lim_{n \to \infty} F\left(g(z_n), g(y_n), g(x_n)\right) = F\left(\lim_{n \to \infty} g(z_n), \lim_{n \to \infty} g(y_n), \lim_{n \to \infty} g(x_n)\right)$$
$$= F(z, y, x).$$

Thus we prove that g(x) = F(x, y, z), g(y) = F(y, x, y) and g(z) = F(z, y, x).

Theorem 3.8 Let (X,d) be a complete metric space and M be a nonempty subset of X^6 . Assume that there is a function $\varphi:[0,\infty)\to [0,\infty)$ with $0=\varphi(0)<\varphi(t)< t$ and $\lim_{r\to t^+}\varphi(t)< t$ for each t>0, and also suppose that $F:X\times X\times X\to X$ and $g:X\to X$ are two continuous functions such that

$$d(F(x,y,z),F(u,v,w)) + d(F(y,x,y),F(v,u,v)) + d(F(z,y,x),F(w,v,u))$$

$$\leq 3\varphi\left(\frac{d(g(x),g(u)) + d(g(y),g(v)) + d(g(z),g(w))}{3}\right)$$

for all $x, y, z, u, v, w \in X$ with $(g(x), g(y), g(z), g(u), g(v), g(w)) \in M$ or $(g(u), g(v), g(w), g(x), g(y), g(z)) \in M$. Suppose that $F(X \times X \times X) \subseteq g(X)$, g commutes with F and (g(X), d) is a complete metric space and for any three sequences $\{x_n\}, \{y_n\}, \{z_n\}$ with $(x_{n+1}, y_{n+1}, z_{n+1}, x_n, y_n, z_n) \in M$, $\{x_n\} \to x$, $\{y_n\} \to y$ and $\{z_n\} \to z$ for all $n \ge 1$ imply $(x, y, z, x_n, y_n, z_n) \in M$ for all $n \ge 1$. If there exists $(x_0, y_0, z_0) \in X \times X \times X$ such that $(F(x_0, y_0, z_0), F(y_0, x_0, y_0), F(z_0, y_0, x_0), g(x_0), g(y_0), g(z_0)) \in M$ and M is an (F, g)-invariant set which satisfies the transitive property, then there exist $x, y, z \in X$ such that

$$g(x) = F(x, y, z),$$
 $g(y) = F(y, x, y)$ and $g(z) = F(z, y, x).$

Proof Consider the Cauchy sequences $\{g(x_n)\}$, $\{g(y_n)\}$ and $\{g(z_n)\}$ as in the proof of Theorem 3.7. Since (g(X),d) is a complete metric space, there exist $x,y,z\in X$ such that $\{g(x_n)\}\to g(x), \{g(y_n)\}\to g(y)$ and $\{g(z_n)\}\to g(z)$. By assumption, we have $(g(x),g(y),g(z),g(x_n),g(y_n),g(z_n))\in M$ for all $n\geq 1$; by the triangle inequality and (6), we get

$$\begin{split} d\big(F(x,y,z),g(x)\big) + d\big(F(y,x,y),g(y)\big) + d\big(F(z,y,x),g(z)\big) \\ &\leq d\big(F(x,y,z),g(x_{n+1})\big) + d\big(g(x_{n+1}),g(x)\big) \\ &+ d\big(F(y,x,y),g(y_{n+1})\big) + d\big(g(y_{n+1}),g(y)\big) \\ &+ d\big(F(z,y,x),g(z_{n+1})\big) + d\big(g(z_{n+1}),g(z)\big) \\ &= d\big(F(x,y,z),F(x_n,y_n,z_n)\big) + d\big(g(x_{n+1}),g(x)\big) \\ &+ d\big(F(y,x,y),F(y_n,x_n,y_n)\big) + d\big(g(y_{n+1}),g(y)\big) \\ &+ d\big(F(z,y,x),F(z_n,y_n,x_n)\big) + d\big(g(z_{n+1}),g(z)\big) \\ &\leq 3\varphi\bigg(\frac{d(g(x_n),g(x)) + d(g(y_n),g(y)) + d(g(z_n),g(z))}{3}\bigg) \\ &+ d\big(g(x_{n+1}),g(x)\big) + d\big(g(y_{n+1}),g(y)\big) + d\big(g(z_{n+1}),g(z)\big). \end{split}$$

Taking the limit as $n \to \infty$ in the inequality above and using the fact that $\lim_{r\to 0^+} \varphi(0) = 0$, we obtain

$$d(F(x, y, z), g(x)) + d(F(y, x, y), g(y)) + d(F(z, y, x), g(z)) = 0,$$

which implies that
$$g(x) = F(x, y, z)$$
, $g(y) = F(y, x, y)$ and $g(z) = F(z, y, x)$.

Example 3.9 Let $X = \mathbb{R}$, d(x, y) = |x - y| and $F : X \times X \times X \to X$ be defined by

$$F(x,y,z) = \frac{4x + y + 2z}{24}, \quad (x,y,z) \in X^3.$$

The mapping F does not satisfy the mixed g-monotone property. Let $M = X^6$ and $(x, y, z, u, v, w) \in M$, we have

$$\left| \frac{4x + y + 2z}{24} - \frac{4u + v + 2w}{24} \right| \le \left| \frac{x - u}{6} \right| + \left| \frac{y - v}{24} \right| + \left| \frac{z - w}{12} \right|,$$

$$\left| \frac{4y + x + 2y}{24} - \frac{4v + u + 2v}{24} \right| \le \left| \frac{y - v}{6} \right| + \left| \frac{x - u}{24} \right| + \left| \frac{y - v}{12} \right|$$

and

$$\left| \frac{4z + y + 2x}{24} - \frac{4w + v + 2u}{24} \right| \le \left| \frac{z - w}{6} \right| + \left| \frac{y - v}{24} \right| + \left| \frac{x - u}{12} \right|.$$

We get

$$\left| \frac{4x + y + 2z}{24} - \frac{4u + v + 2w}{24} \right| + \left| \frac{4y + x + 2y}{24} - \frac{4v + u + 2v}{24} \right|$$

$$+ \left| \frac{4z + y + 2x}{24} - \frac{4w + v + 2u}{24} \right|$$

$$\leq \frac{7}{24} |x - u| + \frac{8}{24} |y - v| + \frac{6}{24} |z - w|.$$

When $\varphi(t) = \frac{t}{2}$ and $g(x) = \frac{t}{2}$, we have

$$\begin{split} &\frac{1}{4} \Big(|x-u| + |y-v| + |z-w| \Big) \\ &= 3 \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{d(g(x), g(u)) + d(g(y), g(v)) + d(g(z), g(w))}{3} \right) \\ &= 3 \varphi \left(\frac{d(g(x), g(u)) + d(g(y), g(v)) + d(g(z), g(w))}{3} \right). \end{split}$$

It is easy to check that F satisfies (6) and (0,0,0) is the tripled coincidence point of F.

If we take the mapping $g = I_X$ in Theorem 3.7 and Theorem 3.8, then we get the following.

Corollary 3.10 Let (X,d) be a complete metric space and M be a nonempty subset of X^6 . Assume that there is a function $\varphi:[0,\infty)\to [0,\infty)$ with $0=\varphi(0)<\varphi(t)< t$ and $\lim_{r\to t^+}\varphi(r)< t$ for each t>0, and also suppose that $F:X\times X\times X\to X$ is a mapping such that

$$d(F(x,y,z),F(u,v,w)) + d(F(y,x,y),F(v,u,v)) + d(F(z,y,x),F(w,v,u))$$

$$\leq 3\varphi\left(\frac{d(x,u) + d(y,v) + d(z,w)}{3}\right)$$
(25)

for all $x, y, z, u, v, w \in X$ with $(x, y, z, u, v, w) \in M$ or $(u, v, w, x, y, z) \in M$. Suppose that either

(a) F is continuous, or

exist $x, y, z \in X$ such that

(b) if for any three sequences $\{x_n\}$, $\{y_n\}$, $\{z_n\}$ with $(x_{n+1},y_{n+1},z_{n+1},x_n,y_n,z_n) \in M$, $\{x_n\} \to x$, $\{y_n\} \to y$ and $\{z_n\} \to z$ for all $n \ge 1$, then $(x,y,z,x_n,y_n,z_n) \in M$ for all $n \ge 1$. If there exists $(x_0,y_0,z_0) \in X \times X \times X$ such that $(F(x_0,y_0,z_0),F(y_0,x_0,y_0),F(z_0,y_0,x_0),x_0,y_0,z_0) \in M$ and M is an F-invariant set which satisfies the transitive property, then there

x = F(x, y, z), y = F(y, x, y) and z = F(z, y, x).

Now we shall prove the uniqueness of a tripled fixed point.

Theorem 3.11 In addition to the hypotheses of Theorem 3.7, suppose that for every $(x,y,z), (x^*,y^*,z^*) \in X \times X \times X$, there exists $(u,v,w) \in X \times X \times X$ such that $(g(x),g(y),g(z),g(u),g(v),g(w)) \in M$ and $(g(x^*),g(y^*),g(z^*),g(u),g(v)),g(w) \in M$. Then F and g have a unique tripled common fixed point, that is, there exists a unique $(x,y,z) \in X \times X \times X$ such that

$$x = g(x) = F(x, y, z),$$
 $y = g(y) = F(y, x, y)$ and $z = g(z) = F(z, y, x).$

Proof From Theorem 3.7, the set of tripled coincidence points is nonempty. Suppose (x, y, z) and (x^*, y^*, z^*) are tripled coincidence points of F, that is, g(x) = F(x, y, z), g(y) = F(y, x, y), g(z) = F(z, y, x), $g(x^*) = F(x^*, y^*, z^*)$, $g(y^*) = F(y^*, x^*, y^*)$ and $g(z^*) = F(z^*, y^*, x^*)$. We shall show that

$$g(x) = g(x^*),$$
 $g(y) = g(y^*)$ and $g(z) = g(z^*).$ (26)

By assumption, there is $(u, v, w) \in X \times X \times X$ such that $(g(x), g(y), g(z), g(u), g(v), g(w)) \in M$ and $(g(x^*), g(y^*), g(z^*), g(u), g(v), g(w)) \in M$.

Put $u_0 = u$, $v_0 = v$, $w_0 = w$ and choose $u_1, v_1, w_1 \in X$.

So that $g(u_1) = F(u_0, v_0, w_0)$, $g(v_1) = F(v_0, u_0, v_0)$ and $g(w_1) = F(w_0, v_0, u_0)$. Then, similarly as in Theorem 3.7, we can inductively define sequences $\{g(u_n)\}$, $\{g(v_n)\}$ and $\{g(w_n)\}$ such that

$$g(u_n) = F(u_{n-1}, v_{n-1}, w_{n-1}),$$
 $g(v_n) = F(v_{n-1}, u_{n-1}, v_{n-1})$
and $g(w_n) = F(w_{n-1}, v_{n-1}, u_{n-1})$ for all $n \ge 1$.

It easy to show that

$$(g(x), g(y), g(z), g(u_n), g(v_n), g(w_n)) \in M \quad \text{for all } n > 1.$$
 (27)

Thus, from (6) and (27), we have

$$\frac{d(g(x), g(u_{n+1})) + d(g(y), g(v_{n+1})) + d(g(z), g(w_{n+1}))}{3}$$

$$= \frac{d(F(x, y, z), F(u_n, v_n, w_n)) + d(F(y, x, y), F(v_n, u_n, v_n))}{3}$$

$$+ \frac{d(F(z, y, x), F(w_n, v_n, u_n)) + d(F(z, y, x), F(w_n, v_n, u_n))}{3}$$

$$\leq \varphi\left(\frac{d(g(x), g(u_n)) + d(g(y), g(v_n)) + d(g(z), g(w_n))}{3}\right) \tag{28}$$

for all $n \ge 1$. Thus, by (28), we deduce that the sequence $\{p_n\}$ is defined by

$$p_n = \frac{d(g(x), g(u_n)) + d(g(y), g(v_n)) + d(g(z), g(w_n))}{3} \quad \text{for all } n \ge 1.$$
 (29)

From (28) and (29), we have that $\{p_n\}$ is non-increasing. Hence, there exists $\alpha \geq 0$ such that

$$\lim_{n\to\infty}p_n=\lim_{n\to\infty}\left(\frac{d(g(x),g(u_n))+d(g(y),g(v_n))+d(g(z),g(w_n))}{3}\right)=\alpha.$$

Suppose, to the contrary, that $\alpha > 0$. Letting $n \to \infty$ in (28), we get

$$\alpha \leq \lim_{n \to \infty} \varphi(p_n) = \lim_{p_n \to \alpha^+} \varphi(p_n) < \alpha$$
,

which is a contradiction. Thus $\alpha = 0$, that is,

$$\lim_{n\to\infty}p_n=\lim_{n\to\infty}\left(\frac{d(g(x),g(u_n))+d(g(y),g(v_n))+d(g(z),g(w_n))}{3}\right)=0,$$

which implies

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} d(g(x), g(u_n)) = \lim_{n \to \infty} d(g(y), g(v_n)) = \lim_{n \to \infty} d(g(z), g(w_n)) = 0.$$
(30)

Similarly, we obtain that

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} d(g(x^*), g(u_n)) = \lim_{n \to \infty} d(g(y^*), g(v_n)) = \lim_{n \to \infty} d(g(z^*), g(w_n)) = 0.$$
(31)

By (30) and (31) and the triangle inequality, we have

$$d(g(x),g(x^*)) \leq d(g(x),g(u_{n+1})) + d(g(u_{n+1}),g(x^*)),$$

$$d(g(y),g(y^*)) \leq d(g(y),g(v_{n+1})) + d(g(v_{n+1}),g(y^*)),$$

$$d(g(z),g(z^*)) \leq d(g(z),g(w_{n+1})) + d(g(w_{n+1}),g(z^*)).$$
(32)

Let $n \to \infty$ in (32). Hence $g(x^*) = g(x)$, $g(y^*) = g(y)$ and $g(z^*) = g(z)$. Since g(x) = F(x, y, z), g(y) = F(y, x, y) and g(z) = F(z, y, x), by commutativity of F and g, we have

$$g(g(x)) = g(F(x, y, z)) = F(g(x), g(y), g(z)),$$

$$g(g(y)) = g(F(y, x, y)) = F(g(y), g(x), g(y)),$$

$$g(g(z)) = g(F(z, y, x)) = F(g(z), g(y), g(x)).$$
(33)

Denote a = g(x), b = g(y) and c = g(z). Then from (33),

$$g(a) = F(a, b, c),$$
 $g(b) = F(b, a, b)$ and $g(c) = F(c, b, a).$ (34)

Thus (a, b, c) is a tripled coincidence point. Then from (26) with $x^* = a$, $y^* = b$ and $z^* = c$ it follows that g(x) = g(a), g(y) = g(b) and g(z) = g(c), that is,

$$g(a) = a,$$
 $g(b) = b$ and $g(c) = c.$ (35)

From (34) and (35), we have

$$a = g(a) = F(a, b, c),$$
 $b = g(b) = F(b, a, b)$ and $w = g(c) = F(c, b, a).$

Therefore, (a, b, c) is a tripled common fixed point of F and g. To prove the uniqueness, assume that (p, q, r) is another coupled common fixed point. Then by (26) we have

$$p = g(p) = g(a) = a$$
, $q = g(q) = g(b) = b$ and $r = g(r) = g(c) = c$.

Next, we give a simple application of our results to tripled coincidence point theorems in partially ordered metric spaces.

Corollary 3.12 Let (X, \leq) be a partially ordered set, and suppose that there is a metric d on X such that (X, d) is a complete metric space. Assume that there is a function $\varphi: [0, \infty) \to [0, \infty)$ with $\varphi(t) < t$ and $\lim_{r \to t^+} \varphi(r) < t$ for each t > 0, and also suppose that $F: X \times X \times X \to X$ and $g: X \to X$ are such that F has the mixed g-monotone property and

$$d(F(x,y,z),F(u,v,w)) + d(F(y,x,y),F(v,u,v)) + d(F(z,y,x),F(w,v,u))$$

$$\leq 3\varphi\left(\frac{d(g(x),g(u)) + d(g(y),g(v)) + d(g(z),g(w))}{3}\right)$$
(36)

for all $x, y, z, u, v, w \in X$ with $g(x) \le g(u)$, $g(y) \ge g(v)$ and $g(z) \le g(w)$. Suppose that $F(X \times X) \subseteq g(X)$, g is continuous and commutes with F and (g(X), d) is a complete metric space and X has the following properties:

- (i) if a non-decreasing sequence $\{x_n\} \to x$ in X, then $x_n \le x$ for all n,
- (ii) if a non-increasing sequence $\{y_n\} \to y$ in X, then $y \le y_n$ for all n.

If there exist $x_0, y_0, z_0 \in X$ *such that*

$$g(x_0) \le F(x_0, y_0, z_0),$$
 $g(y_0) \ge F(y_0, x_0, y_0)$ and $g(z_0) \le F(z_0, y_0, x_0),$

then there exist $x, y, z \in X$ such that

$$g(x) = F(x, y, z),$$
 $g(y) = F(y, x, y)$ and $g(z) = F(z, y, x).$

Proof Define a subset $M \subseteq X^6$ by $M = \{(a, b, c, d, e, f) \in X^6 : a \ge d, b \le e, c \ge f\}$, then M is an (F,g)-invariant set which satisfies the transitive property. By (36), we have

$$d(F(x,y,z),F(u,v,w)) + d(F(y,x,y),F(v,u,v)) + d(F(z,y,x),F(w,v,u))$$

$$\leq 3\varphi\left(\frac{d(g(x),g(u)) + d(g(y),g(v)) + d(g(z),g(w))}{3}\right)$$

for all $x, y, z, u, v, w \in X$ with $(g(x), g(y), g(z), g(u), g(v), g(w)) \in M$ or $(g(u), g(v), g(w), g(x), g(y), g(z)) \in M$. Since $x_0, y_0, z_0 \in X$ such that

$$g(x_0) \le F(x_0, y_0, z_0),$$
 $g(y_0) \ge F(y_0, x_0, y_0)$ and $g(z_0) \le F(z_0, y_0, x_0),$

we get $(F(x_0, y_0, z_0), F(y_0, x_0, y_0), F(z_0, y_0, x_0), g(x_0), g(y_0), g(z_0)) \in M$. For any three sequences $\{g(x_n)\}, \{g(y_n)\}, \{g(z_n)\}$ such that $\{g(x_n)\}$ is a non-decreasing sequence in X with $\{g(x_n)\} \to x$, $\{g(y_n)\}$ is a non-increasing sequence in X with $\{g(y_n)\} \to y$ and $\{g(z_n)\}$ is a non-decreasing sequence in X with $\{g(z_n)\} \to z$, we have

$$g(x_1) \leq g(x_2) \leq \cdots \leq g(x_n) \leq \cdots \leq x$$
,

$$g(y_1) \ge g(y_2) \ge \cdots \ge g(y_n) \ge \cdots \ge y$$

and

$$g(z_1) \leq g(z_2) \leq \cdots \leq g(z_n) \leq \cdots \leq z$$

for all $n \ge 1$. Therefore, we have $(x, y, z, g(x_n), g(y_n), g(z_n)) \in M$ for all $n \ge 1$, and so the assumption of Theorem 3.8 holds, thus F has a triple coincidence point.

Corollary 3.13 In addition to the hypotheses of Corollary 3.12, suppose that for all $(x,y,z), (x^*,y^*,z^*) \in X \times X \times X$, there exists $(u,v,w) \in X \times X \times X$ such that $g(x) \succeq g(u)$, $g(y) \preceq g(v)$, $g(z) \succeq g(w)$ and $g(x^*) \succeq g(u)$, $g(y^*) \preceq g(v)$, $g(z^*) \succeq g(w)$. Then F and g have a unique tripled common fixed point.

Proof Define a subset $M \subseteq X^6$ by $M = \{(a, b, c, d, e, f) \in X^6 : a \ge d, b \le e, c \ge f\}$, then M is an (F,g)-invariant set which satisfies the transitive property. Thus, the proof of the existence of a tripled common fixed point is straightforward by following the same lines as in the proof of Corollary 3.12.

Next, we show the uniqueness of a tripled common fixed point. Since for all (x,y,z), $(x^*,y^*,z^*) \in X \times X \times X$, there exists $(u,v,w) \in X \times X \times X$ such that $g(x) \succeq g(u)$, $g(y) \preceq g(v)$, $g(z) \succeq g(w)$ and $g(x^*) \succeq g(u)$, $g(y^*) \preceq g(v)$, $g(z^*) \succeq g(w)$, we can conclude that $(g(x),g(y),g(z),g(u),g(v),g(w)) \in M$ and $(g(x^*),g(y^*),g(z^*),g(u),g(v),g(w)) \in M$. Therefore, since all the hypotheses of Theorem 3.11 hold, F and g have a unique tripled common fixed point. This completes the proof.

Remark This research can be extended and improved to the more general case; see [9, 35–37].
